

Linda Brent Bath was named Professor Emeritus of Business Technology for Hinds Community College at the Jan. 3 Centennial Convocation. She joins 31 other retired Hinds employees selected for the honor.

Bath of Raymond began her association with Hinds as a student. She later returned to teach at Hinds for 31 years. During that tenure, she taught at the Vicksburg-Warren Campus and the Raymond Campus.

In addition to her teaching responsibilities, she also served as adviser for the Future Business Leaders of America and Phi Beta Lambda. She was the first PBL adviser from Mississippi to be named to the National Wall of Fame. She received the Mississippi Business Education

Teacher of the Year Award and was selected to represent Hinds as the HEADWAE instructor in the annual legislative ceremony honoring faculty and students.

She has remained involved in career and technical education during her retirement years, having served the past ten years as executive director for the Mississippi Association for Career and Technical Education. In that position, she has conducted 10 annual summer conferences and one Region IV Conference and is currently planning the 2017 Region IV conference.

Several Automotive Service Technology students from Lamar County Center for Technical Education competed in separate categories at the SkillsUSA state competition in Jackson on February 28 and March 1. Two of the students won awards in their individual categories. Dalton Robinson (Oak Grove High School) won second place in Motorcycle Service Technology and received a \$5000 scholarship to Universal Technical Institute. Kyler Blackwell (Sumrall High School) won first place in Marine Service Technology and qualified to advance to SkillsUSA National Competition in Louisville,

Kentucky this summer.

The SkillsUSA competition involves written tests as well as skill workstations that require students to demon-

strate repair and troubleshooting. Contestants are judged on technical competency, accuracy, quality, safety, and ability to follow directions.

The Automotive Service Technology program at the Lamar County Technical Center is a two-year program for students in tenth through twelfth grades that prepares them for entry-level employment positions in the automotive repair and service industry or for entry into post-secondary Automotive Technology programs.

Culinary Art students presented workplace safety rules and regulations for foodservice as they took Business Law Students on a tour of the kitchen and cafe. The Business Law class was studying workplace safety and wanted a "real life" experience of how safety rules and regulations are utilized. Culinary students discussed and demonstrated use of cutting boards with knives and how to prevent the cutting board from slipping while in use. Also, students elaborated on the proper use of oven mitts, heat resistant gloves and apron when using the dish machine. Culinary students pointed out the use of code words or lingo to warn others that you are carrying hot food, a knife, or heavy load when passing behind other workers. Students from both classes discussed how OSHA would be utilized in the foodservice industry. Lastly, culinary students presented safety in the dining room such as blocking off an area and cleaning up spills immediately, warning customers if plates or food is very hot, and seating people with special situations so that the pathway is not obstructed.


