

### **PLTW White Coat Ceremony**

On Friday, January 12, 2018, the Vicksburg-Warren Career and Technical Center held its first annual White Coat Ceremony for the students enrolled in the Project Lead The Way Biomedical III Class-Medical Interventions.

The White Coat Ceremony is a symbolic program performed to acknowledge the students' dedication to a Biomedical career and their perseverance through the Biomedical coursework. It was also utilized as the official send-off moment as the students are getting ready to participate in their semester-long job shadow of several medical professionals in the local community. This will be the first year that students will be invited into medical offices at the local schools with school district nurses, Winters Dentistry, and Merit Health in order to see what a day is truly like in the life of a medical professional.

The goal of the elongated job shadowing format is to expose the students to several different careers that they may be interested in, while simultaneously, showcasing how the skills and equipment that they use in the Biomedical classes relate to real-world experiences. During the White Coat Ceremony, students from the Biomedical I and II classes were able to highlight some of their favorite moments of the courses. Biomedical II students read the Biomedical Motto and the Career and Technical's PLTW vision. Sylvia Lamb, the Biomedical I instructor and the 2016-2017 Vicksburg-Warren School District Teacher of the Year, did a brief overview of how PLTW was introduced into the district and how these particular

students have grown since the inception of the nationwide curriculum.

The two student honorees are trailblazers, not only because they are the first Medical Interventions students in the state of Mississippi, but also in their own respective rights. Zachary Moore scored a 9 on the Principles of Biomedical Sciences (Biomedical I) End of Course Exam, which is a perfect score! And Angel Rhodes, a strong, hard-working, individual, was the student that promoted adding the third year class when asked by the Secretary of State during a student panel what could be done to make these classes better. Angel hopes to become an OB-GYN to "bring lives into the world," and Zachary plans to become a Neurosurgeon to "help save lives." A Biomedical II Senior led these students as they took their PLTW Biomedical Hippocratic Oath, after receiving their white coats from Lesley Magee, the Biomedical II and III instructor. Dr. Terence James, the Career and Technical Center's Administrator, ended the program with closing remarks. The program was attended by representatives from the district's Central Office Staff, the District of Innovation Staff, teachers, family members, and students currently enrolled in Biomedical I and II classes.

Immediately following the white coat ceremony, the Biomedical I and II students were treated to Dr. Miles Ashley, of the Vision Clinic, as a guest speaker. Dr. Ashley spoke to the students about the different careers in the medicine field that focuses on the eye, such as opticians,

optometrists, and ophthalmologists. He also spoke about different eye disorders, what caused them, and how they could be treated. Lastly, he spoke about the different tools and tests that are normally run during a routine eye exam and what type of information can be gathered from them. This is Dr. Ashley's second consecutive year that he's agreed to speak to our Biomedical II classes as they wrap up their unit on the eye, and the students learn very valuable lessons from his perspective as a medical professional.

To tackle this project, their students created a bio-filter to mitigate the pollutants flowing into the bayou. # Petal High School Students Winners of Stock Market Competition

Students from Petal High School, coached by Kim Hinton, were named Region Six first place winners in the spring high school division of the Mississippi Stock Market Game (SMG).

The simulation program enables teams of students to invest a hypothetical \$100,000 in the stock market over a 14-week period. Winners are determined on the percentage return above or below S&P 500 growth. The Petal High first place team outperformed the S&P by 10.1% and grew their portfolio to \$105,947.

Wade and Alex will be honored at the Mississippi Council on Economic Education's Annual Awards Ceremony on May 8, 2018, at the Clyde Muse Center in Pearl, MS and receive a cash prize.

The SMG is an online education program used in thousands of classrooms nationwide to help teach math, social studies, business, economics and language skills. The SMG is made possible by the support of more than 600 securities firms, combined with grass-roots support in schools and communities. It is the only stock market simulation

and to assure funding for these programs by communicating and working with legislators and government leaders.




### **Teacher Academy**
