## Choctaw Central C-TEC's DECA Community Service Project

The 2022-23 DECA members at Choctaw Central Career & Technical Education Center (C-TEC) in Choctaw, Mississippi decided that it was time to serve the community. After several meetings, DECA decided that they would do a year-long Community Service Project in which they would have a flag pole erected at where the career technical center campus in which they attend. This was a multi-faceted project that dealt with many areas. Members were exposed to many levels of business. Members spent the whole year planning the location, fundraising activities, obtaining quotes, working with 811,

learning the history of the tribal flag, creating an informational website, learning about citizenship and how to handle and display the flags. Members worked within the many principles of DECA including finance and marketing.

Fundraising activities included selling a knitted blanket with the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians flag on it. They also made and sold t-shirts which had a picture of the MBCI flag

and the back had a QR Code in which people could scan with their cell phone camera and be taken to a website that shared information about the MBCI flag and its history and symbolism, in which the students learned.

On May 5th, 2023, the DECA club was able to have a Flagpole Dedication ceremony. Showcasing all the hard work that was put into making this happen. The ceremony was very formal with special guests Choctaw Tribal Chief Cyrus Ben, Vice Chief Ronnie Henry, and Council members Deborah Martin and Kent Wesley in attendance. Also present were the Choctaw Tribal Schools Director of Schools, Dr. Randy Grierson and Assistant Director of Schools Delnita Jones, Choctaw Central High School Principal Alaric Keams and C-TEC Administrator Sherry Tubby. Students had the high school band to play the National Anthem, while American Indian Day Princess Shaystin Lewis and Brave De'Ryan Williamson recited the Pledge of Allegiance in the Choctaw language. DECA sponsors Susan Strickline and Adam Lewis gave an overview on the process of getting the flagpole at the C-TEC and look forward to next year's Community Service Project.

petition held at Greene County Vo – Tech on March 30, 2023. This competition was started in honor of Darby Ledet, a young man who was tragically killed in an accident last year in Greene County. Both young ladies have consistently been winning local contests throughout the year. During their tenure here at Marion County Career and Tech Center, the young ladies have learned to weld in all four positions using 6010 electrodes as well as 7018. They have welded in the 1F,2F,3F and 4F positions and progressed to the 1G,2G,3G,4G positions as well as the 6G position. The young ladies have welded using GMAW, SMAW, GTAW and FCAW, all processes used in industry. They both can operate both the Oxy Fuel Torch and the hand plasma machine. Both young ladies competed in the Region 5 Skills USA competition where they made up two of the three fabrication team members. Alyana and Rylee give "Weld Like a Girl" a whole new meaning. The Skills That Pay campaign promotes a positive community mindset toward career pathways that demand unique job skills. By competing for these jobs, these emerging workers can avoid debt incurred by high college costs and earn higher salaries faster. In addition, many careers foster stability and better quality of life for students as they transition into adulthood (Skills Foundation of Mississippi, 2022). As part of the campaign, several Hattiesburg High School students interviewed to be representatives for the Foundation's campaign. Kymrie Lofton became a spokesperson, made many appearances in commercials, and participated in speaking engagements for middle and high school students looking for other career



opportunities. Ms. Lofton obtained her associate's degree from Pearl River Community College and her high school diploma from Hattiesburg High in May, and she plans to pursue a career in nursing.

Clifton Carroll and his team finished the year by asking students to record video interviews about their plans after graduating high school. Five students from Hattiesburg High School received a signing bonus for training in their chosen careers. A'dymun Walker and Relond Whitsett received \$1,000.00 signing bonuses, and Zaria Foxworth, Victor Barber, and Kameron Brooks received \$250.00 to continue their training.

## Pass Christian High School FCCLA Chapter Wins National Career Connection Project Award


Pass Christian High School FCCLA, Mississippi, was selected as the 2023 National High School Career Connection Award Winner, sponsored by Goodheart-Wilcox Publisher and Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) for their project "Creating Connections."

Career Connection is a peer education program created by FCCLA, designed to teach students how to prepare for career success now and in the future. The award recognizes chapters that conduct career development projects to help students build skills for success in their families, careers, and communities.

As the National High School Winner, the Pass Christian High School FCCLA chapter will receive a \$1,000 award and be recognized at the 2023 FCCLA National Leadership Conference, July 2 – 6, 2023, in Denver, Colorado.

Several FCCLA members including Claire Dahlike, Aria Grady, Reese Miller and Sarah Taylor worked on the Career Connection project called "Creating Connections." With the goal of providing real world career examples, providing connections between our students and community leaders, and bringing community leaders into our school students linked careers and community members to classes and class standards. These career representatives were invited into our Family and Consumer Science classes to discuss the linked class standards, how they got into their career field, what the daily

activities were in their career and anything else they thought was important to share with students about their career. Two examples of this process was inviting Mr. O'Hara the CEO of the Better Business Bureau Serving Mississippi to discuss the standard "identify a consumer's rights and responsibilities and evaluate consumer information" with the Resource Management class or Mrs. Alicia Tarrant the Youth Outreach Educator for the Gulf Coast Center of Nonviolence, Inc to discuss the standards "identify types of domestic violence, discuss warning signs of violence and identify preventive measures and intervention skills" with the Family Dynamics class. Students filled out guest speaker evaluation forms and this data was shared with guest speakers. A rotation was created for all students to be able to write thank you cards to various guest speakers. This project created a number of partnerships and collaborations. Every community leader who was a guest speaker has become a long-term partnership that has worked with us to help make this project impactful and has joined our Family and Consumer Science Advisory Board which helps build and guides our program in the future. Through this project students learned and used valuable skills including communication, teamwork, business etiquette, organization and more.



## 2023 Pass High FCCLA Members Compete & Win Big

Ten Pass Christian High School (PCHS) students and Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) members traveled to Natchez Mississippi in March to compete at the FCCLA state meeting. The ten students competed in seven different events representing a variety of projects they completed at school and in the community. Students prepared for several months and were excited to have the opportunity to show their hard work. The Natchez Convention Center was full of students from across Mississippi all ready to compete and grow as leaders! Pass High junior Allie Armstrong remarked, "This was my first year competing, and I wouldn't trade my experience for anything. During my time in Natchez I learned a lot of valuable skills like patience and teamwork. My team and I worked through multiple obstacles before and during our event competition and we overcame them. I'm very grateful for the experience and can't wait for next year!"

FCCLA is a national career and technical student organization (CTSO) for students in Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) education in public and private schools through grade 12. FCCLA offers intra-curricular resources and opportunities for students to pursue careers that support families. Since 1945, FCCLA members have been making a difference in their families, careers, and communities by addressing important personal, work, and societal issues through FCS education. With more than 228,000 student members throughout the country, Pass High students join a growing force to make a difference in their world.

Students Taking Action with Recognition (STAR) Events are Competitive Events in which members compete at the state and national levels. Students are recognized for proficiency and achievement in chapter and individual projects, leadership skills, and career preparations. STAR Events allow students to compete individually or as a team. There are more than 30 STAR events students can choose to compete in, all of which recognize participants who demonstrate their knowledge, skills and abilities to actively identify an issue concerning families, careers or communities, research a topic, and develop and implement a project to advocate for positive change.

This year Pass Christian High FCCLA members excelled by placing in the top 3 in EVERY event they entered!

- Breanna Huguet won 1st in the state (Gold) in the Food Innovation level 3 event with her "Meal Munchiez: Every Meal Deserves to End with a Cookie" concept.
- Cayden Cunningham won 2nd in the state (silver) in National Programs in Action level 3 event by using the FCCLA National Program-Student Body to create and carry out his project "Peace, Love & School Lunch."
- Aria Grady won 1st in the state (Gold) in Promote and Publicize FCCLA level 2 event with her year long "IncREDible FCCLA" campaign.
- Ethan Campbell and Brennan Davis won 1st in the state (Gold) in Sports Nutrition level 2 event with their IncREDible Nutrition Plan for fellow classmate and track athlete Brinley Hodo.
- Savannah "Arbor" Lentz won 2nd in the state (Silver) in Chapter Service Project level 2 event with her "IncREDible Interactions" project that featured PCHS FCCLA's community service with local nursing home. Lentz's design was also chosen and will be the official FCCLA lapel pin design for all chapters in the state. This designed pin will be used at the national convention and will be the official FCCLA pin for the state of Mississippi.

While in Natchez, Mississippi for the competition, students also networked with other students and teachers from across the state, learned about Mississippi history, and had fun together. Arbor Lentz shares her experience, "Traveling to Natchez for the FCCLA state competition was an incredible experience that I hope to be able to do again in the coming years. From making friends from other Mississippi high schools and giggling in the waiting room lobby to presenting in front of judges in an otherwise quiet room is a surreal experience that I wouldn't change for the world. Throughout my personal experience in this organization, I've done things I never thought I was capable of doing. I once cried whenever I had to read in front of my class. Now I'm able to give speeches with full confidence in front of the entire Mississippi FCCLA State meeting and competition of over 1,000 students and teachers. This organization has taught me so much and I know I'll learn just as much next year. FCCLA truly is the Ultimate Leadership Experience."

This year is the second year for re-establishing the Pass Christian High's FCCLA Chapter and it has really taken off growing from 21 to 45 members in just 2 years. Adviser and Pass High Teacher Jennifer Frye said, "Students are excited to be empowered to learn, connect with others, and make a difference in their communities. Then to add on the ability to compete and share their work builds a sense of pride." This entire year of projects and the group's trip to the state competition was funded by the Caesar Foundation grant. This grant has enabled students to plan and carry out numerous projects that positively impacted our schools, students, and community. We are very grateful for this grant and the opportunities it provided this year. Due to placing in the top 3 in the state at the FCCLA state competi-



tion, these students are eligible for the New Century Skills Scholarship from MGCCC, making this an opportunity that will keep growing for these students. Lastly, several of these students advanced and are eligible to represent Pass Christian High School and the state of Mississippi at the National FCCLA Meeting and competition in Denver, Colorado this July. Attendance is still being decided, but students are excited for the opportunity.















## The Gift of Light

## Coaching and Caring: Working Together to Strengthen Mississippi's Talent Pipeline

The Central Mississippi Planning and Development District (CMPDD) has launched the career coaching program in Vicksburg Mississippi. The Vicksburg Warren School District is proud to welcome Monica Watson and Alexandria Burrell as the newest supports for student success. Through this program high schools will be allowed to advocate for workforce development and training and expose students to post-high school career and training opportunities in their communities. Students will also have the opportunity to learn about career opportunities and employer expectations. Students in the district now have an advocate and mentor that walks them through career planning experiences and work-based learning opportunities designed to change students' lives and make communities stronger. Particularly in the Vicksburg Warren School District, where the mission is to ensure that ALL students graduate college, life, and career prepared, the intervention of Career Coaches will be paramount. Additionally, employers will see an additional pipeline of skilled workers who have the technical, academic, and hands-on

training needed to match unfilled vacancies in their companies both locally and statewide. Innovative District Director, Curtis Ross shared, "The Career Coach positions at each of the high schools brings an additional support to our district as we continue to encourage and build positive relationships through networking with industry and increase one on one coaching, particularly for those students who need it the most." The Career Coach model has proven successful in several districts throughout the state, as thirteen new Career Coaches have been officially deployed throughout four Mississippi counties (Hinds, Madison, Adams, and Warren). In the Vicksburg Warren School District, the Career Coaches have been embraced and enjoy the full support of teachers, students, and the administration. Alexandria Burrell, Career Coach (Warren Central High School) shared an early success story in only her first month. "We have been accepted all over the place," said Burrell. She went on to highlight the placement of a student in a paid internship role with Keller Williams Realty-New Beginnings under the leadership of Lucy DeRossette, an independent real estate contractor. Burrell added, "We are meeting students where they are on the road; whether that road is leading them to college or to the workplace." The possibilities to positively influence educational outcomes and increase career trajectories for students in Vicksburg, MS is even more of a reality since the Career Coach positions have been introduced. These Career Coaches are assisting students to identify career goals through personal and group consultation while promoting both academic and personal success through student advocacy. As the Career Coach program grows, so will the opportunities for students to develop their skills and talents so that they can prepare, prefer, and perform as a part of Mississippi's tapestry of world class workforce and highly accomplished academic talent.


