
Forrest County AHS SKILLS USA members participated in regional competition at Jones College on February 8.


CTE Students Celebrate CTE Month With Recruitment Visit



Friday's Energy Efficiency Kit Distribution to the Vicksburg public citizens was a success and gave our Energy students an opportunity to serve the community directly. This event was supported by volunteers from our Energy Pathway students & Instructor-Dr. Steve Adzanu; Vicksburg Warren School District's CTE Staff; Hinds CC's CTE Staff; Automotive Technology, instructor Mr. Arthur Thompson, students and Warren County Supervisor and Entergy retiree Kelle Barfield & Hinds CC Security Team. A few minutes prior to the start of the distribution, Co. Supervisor Barfield spoke with the Energy Pathway students on their career path options, in the Energy Industry, after high school graduation. Supervisor Barfield also gave the young men advice from her Entergy career and well-traveled point of view.

On Hinds CC's Vicksburg campus, Friday 12/15/2023, we distributed 1000 (\$300 value) kits to the public that consisted of an upgraded power surge protector, upgraded CFL light bulbs, weather stripping, night light, and faucet aerators. All items were created to use less power in the home thus saving more money on utility bills. This was a heart-warming event for all volunteers distributing the kits and citizens receiving them for they all wore smiles of laughter amidst the gleaming







bright sunshine and unusually warmer temperature on that Friday. Stemming from this event, Triumph Church and other community organizations have decided to distribute more of the Energy Efficiency kits, provided and funded by Entergy, to Vicksburg citizens during their monthly outreach event in the near future.
