Enrollment slots are limited and students must meet board approved criteria in order to attend. The programs at Lamar Technical Center give students an excellent opportunity to learn about specific career paths and the skills necessary to obtain employment in technical and academic fields."

# **VEX Robotics Competition**

The Lamar County Technical Center and Oak Grove High School hosted the first Lamar County VEX Competition on Saturday, January 12, 2013. Six teams from across the state of Mississippi competed in 16 qualification rounds and two elimination rounds. Tournament Champions were MCVTC Robotics (Aberdeen, MS), Lamar Technical Robotics (Purvis, MS), and Woolfolk Middle School TSA (Yazoo City, MS). Woolfolk Middle School TSA also won the sportsmanship award.



The VEX Robotics Competition is the largest and fastest growing middle and high school robotics program globally with more than 4,800 teams from 20 countries playing in over 300 tournaments worldwide. Students, with guidance from their teachers and mentors, design and build robots that collect bean bag sacks and place them in bins. Teams work together to obtain the most points possible. While participating in an exciting and fun VEX robotics competition, students learn many teamwork and academic skills. Teresa Sappington, Engineering Instructor at Lamar Technical Center and competition coordinators stated, "This competition is an excellent opportunity for our students to apply skills and concepts they've learned in our Engineering program."

# **STEM Students Helping the Environment**

# Health Sciences Students Participate in Hospital Disaster Drill

Mrs. Thomas' 2nd year Health Sciences students at Choctaw County Career and Technology Center played the roles of the victims in a staged fire at the Ackerman Community Center. Each of the 12 students was given a list of injuries that they sustained in the "fire". These injuries ranged from a headache and sprained ankle to severe burns to difficulty breathing. Depending on the severity of their injuries, the victims were transported to the helicopter or hospital by ambulance or bus. Once at the hospital, the victims were treated as real patients. Lab work and x-rays were done, wounds were dressed and broken bones were splinted by the hospital staff. Participating in this drill allowed the students to learn more about how the hospital and the emergency medical services in our community work together during a disaster.

# AEST: Science of Agricultural Animals at Ackerman High School

Poultry, a \$2.4 billion dollar industry, is Mississippi's number one agricultural industry. In 2011, there were approximately 765 million broilers produced in Mississippi on 1,478 farms. With the addition of the Science of

Agricultural Animals course offered through AEST, came an incubator and brooder to hatch and raise baby chicks and/or quail. The Animal Science class at Ackerman High School recently learned about various breeds of livestock including poultry. A Leghorn chicken is a popular breed and is the breed students have been experimenting with in the incubator. Eggs are incubated for 21 days. On the 10th day of incubation, students candled eggs to see if the eggs were fertilized. When held over the light, if the entire egg glows, that shows the egg is unfertilized.

Students were looking for a small air sac. On the 16th day when students candled the eggs they were able to see blood vessels. As the chicks arrived, students did a wonderful job caring for them and some of the students even took them home when they were old enough to leave the incubator.
