### 2021 Administrator of the Year

Dr. Lenora Hogan, Director of Career and Technical Education/Academy Coach, was named the 2021 Administrator of the Year by the MS Association of Secondary Career and Technical Administrators. Hogan is a native of Starkville, Mississippi, and serves as Director at the center she was a Food Service student and HERO gold medal recipient. She later became secretary at Millsaps before becoming CTE Director. During her 25 years in education, Dr. Hogan has been very fortunate. During her five years as Director, Millsaps Career and Technology Center has earned the 100% Achieve Award for four consecutive years. Dr. Hogan has added seven programs and was instrumental in implementing the Career Academy Model. Starkville High School is now the only school in the state that has wall to wall academies. In January of 2020, Dr. Hogan was one of 19 public school leaders from across the state to serve on Lt. Governor Delbert Hosemann's Administrator Advisory Council. She also serves on the Mississippi Department of Education's Principals' Advisory Council, as well as, the Mississippi Department of Education's Career & Technical Education Advisory Council. In August of 2020, Dr. Hogan was selected as a fellow in the National Career Academy Coalition Career Academy Leaders' Collaborative, where she successfully completed the program. Dr.

Hogan enjoys giving back to the community. She currently serves on the Board of Directors for the J. L. King Center, the Mississippi Association of Secondary Career and Technical Administrators where she serves as vice president and Project Peace at the Discovery Center. Dr. Hogan is a member of the Lions Club of Starkville and serves as the Leo Club advisor at Starkville High School. Dr. Hogan is also a member of the 100 Women Who Care of Starkville.

## SOSD and Starkville Utilities Launch Innovative Academic Houses Program

The Starkville Oktibbeha School District is teaming with Starkville Utilities on a new program designed to put high school students on an advanced path toward career success.

The Academic Houses at

Starkville High School creates a new kind of high school experience through small learning communities with engaging, hands-on opportunities that leverage students' interests to make school more relevant. Also offered are dual enrollment and advanced placement courses for students pursuing

"We believe a community-based approach that highlights local employers and career opportunities is a great way to prepare the workforce of the future," said Dr. Eddie Peasant, SOCSD superintendent. "We've designed a robust curriculum that addresses modern workforce needs, and ultimately, the involvement of Starkville Utilities and other program partners will be key in creating successful outcomes for graduates."

Courses are grouped into three houses: Technology, Engineering and Construction; Communications Arts and Business; and Health and Human Service. Starkville Utilities is the lead partner for the TEC house, which encompasses engineering, computer



science, manufacturing, logistics, aerospace, unmanned aviation and robotics.

"As the first program partner, we're excited about this opportunity to provide students with an innovative program that increases their chances for success after graduation," said Terry Kemp, general manager of Starkville Utilities. "An important part of the Renew Principle is investing in the community, and workforce development is critical in ensuring our students have the resources they need to achieve their career goals."

The Academic Houses journey begins in ninth grade with Keystone, a college and career readiness course that focuses on the 16 career clusters to help students determine their interests and skills and build a career profile to help them choose an Academic House.

In 10th grade, students are ready to declare an Academic House and begin their chosen learning pathways. Sophomores also participate in coordinated learning experiences through site visits with area employers that match their professional interests, as well as visits to post-secondary colleges and universities.

During their junior year, students can start earning college credits through dual credit/dual enrollment options, as well as specialized certifications and endorsements through career-track coursework. Job shadowing, which allows them to observe and interact with career professionals in the workplace, is an important part of their learning experience

Seniors have the opportunity for individual work experiences through job internships and may earn the ACT WorkKeys National Career Readiness Certificate, which measures and certifies essential work skills needed for success in jobs across industries and occupations.

"In addition to helping students build a better future, we see this program as an investment in the future of our industry," Kemp said. "By serving as a lead partner, we're helping create a talent pipeline of students who may one day become Starkville Utilities employees. We want them to know that we're one of many local businesses offering stable, rewarding careers and opportunities for professional growth."

# Students Design and Build Indoor Playset

What started out as a need for Kid-Sense, PA in Pontotoc, MS turned into a performance based assessment and a chance to give back to the community for students at Pontotoc Ridge Career and Technology Center. Mrs. Maegan Mills, OTA at KidSense presented PRCTC





instructor, Amanda Wood with the need of KidSense, PA in Pontotoc, MS. Meagan described a need for an indoor playset that would benefit children of all ages undergoing occupational therapy. Megan listed out the parameters as it needed to be an a-frame, collapsible, around 6' tall and 4' wide. She also stated that it needed to have a slide. Meagen described what she does as an Occupational Therapist and how this playset would help children improve their gross motor skills.

First, the students investigated Occupational Therapy Careers and how engineers can work with the medical field. Then the students began to brainstorm ideas and designs for this project. They researched playsets, safety, and ergonomics. After coming up with a general design, 3d models were constructed in Solidworks and supplies were ordered.

The Engineering class partnered with the Construction class to build a half scale model. After the small scale design was built, the students tested the design and made changes as needed.

The students revised the design based on the testing and began the construction of the full scale structure. The full construction took the Engineering and Carpentry class several months to complete.

After the full scale model was complete, the Early Childhood Education class assessed the design for safety. The Early Childhood class reported any safety concerns, and the Engineering and Carpentry students worked on the structure to meet the safety guidelines given. After another complete and thorough inspection by the Early Childhood Education class, the project was complete.

In May of 2021, students from Pontotoc Ridge Career and Technology Center delivered the final product to KidSense. Students presented the playset and were able to learn more about the field of Occupational Therapy.

### **Achieve 100 Percent Award Winners**

### **HCCTC Hosts Wellness Fair**


